## Evidence

The 78-year-old was abducted from her Shrewsbury home and later found dead in a copse in the shadow of Haughmond Hill, near Shrewsbury, in 1984.

She had been repeatedly stabbed, although a post mortem concluded she died of hypothermia.

Mr Green said he has uncovered DNA evidence not used in George's trial that could acquit him.
